a. Sun in your garden: Preventing problems!

Planning the schedule. The good teacher carefully plans the schedule, adapting to the preferences, needs and ages of the children. The idea with organizing your class is to have all the activities possible, in this way you have a class that draws the attention of children and you will also struggle less with discipline.



b. Water your garden: Showing love to the children!

We do not know everything. Never hesitate to ask other experienced teachers for advice and you can observe their classes to help you. Asking for help is not a sign of weakness, but of maturity and a desire to learn more. Children do not care what you know until they know that you care. Therefore, showing that you love them is very important, if they are going to learn from you.



c. Weed your garden: Maintaining discipline!

Lower voice and ask for a class response. If the group is getting too noisy during an activity, drop your voice to very soft and ask the class to raise their hands if they can hear you. When the noisy talkers see the class respond to you, curiosity will shush them as they try to discover what they just missed. Example "Touch your nose if you heard everything I just said."
